THIS SUNDAY'S MASS READINGS

Entrance Antiphon: Let us all rejoice in the Lord, as we celebrate the feast day in honour of all the Saints, at whose festival the Angels rejoice and praise the Son of God.

1st Reading from the book of Apocalypse: 7:2-4. 9-14.

Responsorial Psalm Ps 23:1-6. R cf. v6: Such are the men who seek your face, O Lord.

2nd Reading: from the first letter of St John: 3:1-3

Gospel Acclamation: Alleluia, alleluia! Come to me, all you who labour and are overburdened, and I will give you rest, says the Lord . Alleluia!

Gospel: Matthew: 5:1-12

Communion Antiphon: Blessed are the clean of heart, for they shall see God. Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called children of God. Blessed are they who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness, for theirs is the Kingdom of Heaven.

THE WEEK AHEAD: WHAT'S HAPPENING

The obligation to attend Sunday Mass is still suspended. But if you are able to come, all are welcome to Mass at St Columba's.

There is Mass every day at 10am except Saturday, plus 8am and 6.30pm Mass every Sunday, as well as a vigil Mass at 6.30pm on Saturdays.

ALL SAINTS

All Saints highlights the universality of call to holiness. Being a saint is the ordinary goal of every Christian life. The biggest failure of any person in life is to fail to be a saint. For this reason, failure can never be associated with not having a fat bank account, not having the best career not having a big salary and so on and so forth. Biggest failure in life is failing to be a person God wants us to be. The most important principle in the eyes of God is for all of us to be saints and enter his kingdom. To be a saint is to do the will of God. The will if God is to love, love is the core of our Christian life. To love God and our neighbour means willing the good of the other.

To be a saint is summed up by Jesus in the sermon on the mount. Beatitudes remind us how to be a saint. It tells us we are a saint if we are poor, meaning we are not obsessed with the wealth of this world. We are a saint if we do not allow ourselves to be governed by the material things of this world. We are lucky if we do not mind to be poor because we are not distracted by the pleasures of this world. We are saints if we mourn because we cannot enjoy the pleasures of this world. We deprived ourselves of any form of pleasure linked with this world because we do not want to upset the Lord. To be a saint is to be clean of heart, heart is the core of our being, the purity of hear means we are single hearted in loving God. Divisiveness implies that our heart is split between loving God and the treasures of this world. Hunger and thirst for righteousness mean that we are a saint if our business in life is pursuing the will of God. We are not tempted to pursue the power of this world because we are more concerned of doing the will of God.

We are saints if we rid ourselves of all kinds of impurities of this world. We are saints because we are not addicted to power. We are saints if we are not addicted to worldly honour. Doing the will of God means that we are marginalised and not liked by the people around us. What counts is that we belong among the saints when we march in to the glory of heaven.



ST COLUMBA'S NEEDS YOU

The only way we are able to keep St Columba's open for Mass during this pandemic is because of the generosity, with their time and commitment, of our team of stewards. They are essential in our complying with the requirements agreed between our Church and the government for keeping churches open.

REMEMBER THE NEW RULES WHEN COMING TO CHURCH...

Don't forget, whether coming to Mass or to Tuesday Adoration, that we must all comply with the following rules:

- 1. Remember to bring and wear a face mask.
- 2. Enter the church via the side door leading into the Sacred Heart chapel/confessional, observe the one-way system and leave via the centre back door.
- 3. Provide a written note and this applies every time you come to church – of your name and contact details (phone number or email or postal address) plus the date and, if relevant, Mass time. To save queuing, why not send an email to selsdon@rcaos.org.uk?

- 4. Use hand sanitizer, provided, both when entering and leaving the church.
- 5. Do not move the chairs which have replaced our benches and are at 1m intervals to ensure the necessary social distancing.
- 6. Don't expect to find Mass or prayer books or any other shared items: bring your own. That applies to readers as well.
- 7. Remember that singing is not allowed.
- Don't forget that Holy Communion is silent come forward when directed by the stewards and receive with arms fully outstretched, palms upwards.
- 9. Before leaving the church (i.e. before you come up to receive Holy Communion), turn your chair back to front so that the stewards know which ones to clean afterwards.
- 10. Unless staying for Adoration, on Tuesdays, leave the church straight after Holy Communion.

Please note: the toilets at church cannot be used.

70: THE TOTAL ALLOWED IN CHURCH

Originally the number was lower but as a result of some more rearranging of benches we can now accommodate up to 70 people in church.

If there are already that number inside when you arrive, the stewards will advise that you cannot come into the church.

So far that situation has not arisen -63 is the largest number we have had at St Columba's and that was Sunday 27^{th} September at 10am.

OFFERTORY COLLECTIONS

Thank you for your kind offerings at Mass.

For 18^{th} October the total was £322.07 of which £100 was gift aided and £222.07 not.

The collection figures for 25th October will be included in the newsletter next week.

If you are a taxpayer and not already signed up for Gift Aid (which, at no cost to you, enables St Columba's to reclaim from the Government tax you have already paid) contact Fr Roy or Deacon Philip for details of how to join the scheme.

MAKE YOUR OWN GIFT AID ENVELOPES

We have not been able to distribute new Gift Aid envelopes because of the coronavirus. There is a way round that, however, to ensure that St Columba's continues to benefit from Gift Aid which adds an extra 25p to parish income for every pound that you give to the Offertory collection. All you need to do is to put your offering in any blank envelope on which you then write 'Gift Aid' plus your name. Then place that envelope in the Offertory collection box/basket at church. Better still, set up a standing order. (See 'Make A Pledge For Our Parish'.)



HOW TO HELP ST C'S WHEN SHOPPING ONLINE – AT NO EXTRA COST TO YOURSELF

Thinking of buying something online? Anything? A new washing machine or fridge or freezer or tumble dryer or any other white goods? MAKE A PLEDGE FOR OUR PARISH

The dramatic fall in the numbers attending Mass has, not surprisingly, had a knock-on effect on parish finances. With significantly fewer people at Mass on Sunday, the Offertory collection is much reduced.

But regular parish bills still have to be paid and the amount of money available from the Offertory collection to do so is now much less than it was a year ago, before the pandemic lockdown.

So, to ensure the future financial wellbeing of St Columba's, we are asking all parishioners to review their offerings to support the work and mission of the parish. This, of course, is in the light of the fifth commandment of the Church which is 'To contribute to the support of our pastors.'

There are various ways of giving, whether you are coming to church or not. As well as cash in the basket at Mass, they include payment by cheque and standing order. For taxpayers, there is also the option of signing up for Gift Aid which boosts your offering by 25p for every £1 you pay - and at no extra cost to yourself.

Attached is a form inviting you to make a pledge of support for St Columba's and which also sets out all the options. It includes a standing order form.

Do give some thought to this: we all need our church, we all need to support the work and mission of the parish - and we all need to take responsibility for supporting St Columba's financially.
