A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE 30th SUNDAY ORDINARY TIME BY FR ROY

Love of God and Love of neighbour

The commandment of love appears to be easy because it is one of the most familiar phrases but the application of it in everyday life is indeed a real challenge. The difficulty lies in evaluating the circumstances and applying the moral principle in every unique situation. The need to synchronise the mind set of every Christian to the values and mind of Christ demands a regularly study of scripture. Praying

the sacred scripture provides every follower of Jesus Christ the platform to absorb the values of the word of God. This explains why the consistent study of the sacred scripture is necessary for everyone. Praying then with the sacred scripture is essential in order to make the word of God central to our daily life. In this light, we can appreciate more the dedication of the Jewish people to the study of the sacred scripture particularly of the Old Testament. Familiarity with sacred scripture not only empowers the believer but it also amplifies the faith of the believer knowing that their faith is supported by a genuine knowledge of the word of God. The readings this Sunday teach us to review our familiarity with the word of God, it simply encourages us to make the word of God central to our daily routine. The centrality of the word of God is crucial for all of us because everything hinges on our knowledge of the word of God. The word of God becomes the fountain of our relationship with God. God reveals himself to us through the sacred scripture and we come to know more also about ourselves through the word of God.

Love of God and love of neighbour are two general commandments that need to be dissected and apply in every aspect of our lives. The capability of every Christian to follow Jesus depends so much on their knowledge of the sacred scripture. We often wonder the relevance of prayer in our daily lives. The church cannot help but to emphasize the importance of prayer because it is the primary engine of one's spiritual life. If we review the lifestyle of the monks inside the monastery. Everything revolves around the individual prayer life of every monk and their community prayer. The call to prayer is the primary motivation for everyone to carry on their monastic life. Prayer gives them the energy to sustain the demanding routine of prayer and work.

This situation calls for us to review the dysfunctional routine of our lives. We cannot expect to be spiritually healthy if our spiritual foundation is shallow. We ought to have a solid foundation for our spiritual life. Definitely, the love of God and love of neighbour require not just reception of the sacraments. It demands a healthy prayer life based on sacred scriptures. The word of God is the central factor for a solid relationship with God. We get to know more God through our knowledge of the sacred scripture. Likewise, maturity of our relationship with God depends also in the intensity of our prayer life and commitment to the values that we learned from the sacred scripture. Ultimately, the love of God and neighbour are commandments that need a life time to accomplish. For that reason, every single day of our lives demands that we put the commandment alive. Thus, only in praying that we achieve the genuine purpose of our relationship with God.

REMEMBER THE NEW RULES WHEN COMING TO CHURCH...

Don't forget, whether coming to Mass or to Tuesday Adoration, that we must all comply with the following rules:

1. Remember to bring and wear a face mask.
2. Enter the church via the side door leading into the Sacred Heart chapel/confessional, observe the one-way system and leave via the centre back door.
3. Provide a written note – and this applies every time you come to church – of your name and contact details (phone number or email or postal address) plus the date and, if relevant, Mass time. To save queuing, why not send an email to selsdon@rcaos.org.uk?
4. Use hand sanitizer, provided, both when entering and leaving the church.
5. Do not move the chairs which have replaced our benches and are at 1m intervals to ensure the necessary social distancing.
6. Don't expect to find Mass or prayer books or any other shared items: bring your own. That applies to readers as well.
7. Remember that singing is not allowed.
8. Don't forget that Holy Communion is silent – come forward when directed by the stewards and receive with arms fully outstretched, palms upwards.
9. Before leaving the church (i.e. before you come up to receive Holy Communion), turn your chair back to front so that the stewards know which ones to clean afterwards.
10. Unless staying for Adoration, on Tuesdays, leave the church straight after Holy Communion.

Please note: the toilets at church cannot be used.

70: THE TOTAL ALLOWED IN CHURCH

Originally the number was lower but as a result of some more rearranging of benches we can now accommodate up to 70 people in church.

If there are already that number inside when you arrive, the stewards will advise that you cannot come into the church.

So far that situation has not arisen – 63 is the largest number we have had at St Columba's and that was Sunday 27th September at 10am.

OFFERTORY COLLECTIONS

Thank you for your kind offerings at Mass.

For 11th October the total was £714.19 of which £298 was gift aided and £416.19 not.

For 18th October the total was £322.07 of which £100 was gift aided and £222.07 not.

Other monies amounted to £61.42 of which £41 was for Repository items and £20.42 to Votive Candles.

If you are a taxpayer and not already signed up for Gift Aid (which, at no cost to you, enables St Columba's to reclaim from the Government tax you have already paid) contact Fr Roy or Deacon Philip for details of how to join the scheme.

MAKE YOUR OWN GIFT AID ENVELOPES

We have not been able to distribute new Gift Aid envelopes because of the coronavirus. There is a way round that, however, to ensure that St Columba's continues to benefit from Gift Aid which adds an extra 25p to parish income for every pound that you give to the Offertory collection. All you need to do is to

put your offering in any blank envelope on which you then write 'Gift Aid' plus your name. Then place that envelope in the Offertory collection box/basket at church. Better still, set up a standing order. (See 'Make A Pledge For Our Parish'.)



HOW TO HELP ST C'S WHEN SHOPPING ONLINE – AT NO EXTRA COST TO YOURSELF

The dramatic fall in the numbers attending Mass has, not surprisingly, had a knock-on effect on parish finances. With significantly fewer people at Mass on Sunday, the Offertory collection is much reduced.

But regular parish bills still have to be paid and the amount of money available from the Offertory collection to do so is now much less than it was a year ago, before the pandemic lockdown.

So, to ensure the future financial wellbeing of St Columba's, we are asking all parishioners to review their offerings to support the work and mission of the parish. This, of course, is in the light of the fifth commandment of the Church which is 'To contribute to the support of our pastors.'

There are various ways of giving, whether you are coming to church or not. As well as cash in the basket at Mass, they include payment by cheque and standing order. For taxpayers, there is also the option of signing up for Gift Aid which boosts your offering by 25p for every £1 you pay - and at no extra cost to yourself.

Attached is a form inviting you to make a pledge of support for St Columba's and which also sets out all the options. It includes a standing order form.

Do give some thought to this: we all need our church, we all need to support the work and mission of the parish - and we all need to take responsibility for supporting St Columba's financially.
